KEYNOTE SPEAKERS BIOGRAPHIES

Christopher B. Barrett

Chris Barrett is Professor at the Department of Applied Economics and Management, Cornell University. He holds degrees from Princeton (A.B. 1984), Oxford (M.S. 1985) and the University of Wisconsin-Madison (dual Ph.D., 1994). There are three basic, interrelated thrusts to his research program: (i) poverty, hunger, food security, economic policy and the structural transformation of low-income societies, (ii) individual and market behavior under risk and uncertainty, and (iii) the interrelationship between poverty, food security and environmental stress in developing areas. Professor Barrett has published widely and is an associate editor of Agricultural Economics, the American Journal of Agricultural Economics, Environment and Development Economics, the Journal of African Economies and World Development. He co-directs Cornell University's African Food Security and Natural Resources Management program and the Rural Livelihoods and Biological Resources workshop.

Simon Maxwell

Simon Maxwell is Director of the Overseas Development Institute in London. He is an economist who has published widely on agriculture, rural development and food security. His career includes ten years overseas, in Kenya, India and Bolivia, first with UNDP and then with the British aid Program, and then fifteen years or so as a Fellow of the Institute of Development Studies at the University of Sussex. He became Director of ODI in 1997. Current research interests include rethinking rural development, food security transitions, and aspects of the new poverty agenda. Simon Maxwell is currently President of the Development Studies Association of the UK and Ireland.

Alain de Janvry

Alain de Janvry is an economist working on international economic development, with expertise principally in Latin America, Sub-Saharan Africa, the Middle-East, and the Indian subcontinent. Fields of work include poverty analysis, rural development, quantitative analysis of development policies, impact analysis of social programs, technological innovations in agriculture, and the management of common property resources. He has worked with many international development agencies, including FAO, IFAD, the World Bank, UNDP, ILO, the CGIAR, and the Inter-American Development Bank as well as foundations such as Ford, Rockefeller and Kellogg. His main objective in teaching, researching, and working with development agencies is the promotion of human welfare, including understanding the determinants of poverty and analyzing successful approach to improve well-being and promote sustainability in resource use. He is a member of the French National Academy of Agriculture and a fellow of the American Agricultural Economic Association.

Ulrich Koester

Ulrich Koester is Professor at the Institute of Agricultural Economics in Kiel. He received his doctoral degree from the University of Göttingen, and became a post-doctorate fellow at the Economics Department of the University of California, Berkeley. For 10 years Prof. Koester was a visiting research fellow for 3–5 months annually at the International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI). Among his many publications are *Regional Cooperation to Improve Food Security in Southern and Eastern African Countries*, IFPRI Report No .53, and *Disharmonies in EC and US Agricultural Policy Measures* (Editor), Report for the European Commission.

Daniel A. Sumner

Daniel A. Sumner is the Director of the University of California, Agricultural Issues Center and the Frank H. Buck, Jr. Professor, Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics, University of California, Davis where he has been since 1993. His research centers on the effects of economic and trade policy on agriculture in the United States and Developing countries. Earlier Sumner was on the Economics faculty of North Carolina State University and spent several years on leave in government service as a Senior economist at the President's Council of Economic Advisers and as Assistant Secretary for Economics at the USDA. Sumner's research and writing has won American Agricultural Economic Association awards for Quality of Research, Quality of Communication, and Distinguished Policy Contribution. He was named a fellow of the association in 1999. Sumner was raised on a fruit farm in California. He received his Ph.D. in economics from the University of Chicago in 1978.

Peter Hazell

Peter Hazell joined IFPRI in 1992 as Director of the Environment and Production Technology Division. He was previously a principal economist in the World Bank's Agriculture and Rural Development Department. Prior to that he served at IFPRI as Director of the Agricultural Growth Linkages Program. A British citizen, Hazell obtained his Ph.D. in agricultural economics at Cornell University. He has published widely on agricultural sector modeling, risk management, agricultural growth linkages, property rights systems in Africa, the impact of the green revolution, links between agricultural research and poverty reduction, development strategies for less-favored areas, and sustainable farming practices.

Shenggen Fan

Shenggen Fan is Senior Research Fellow at IFPRI. He leads a research program on rural public investment, growth and poverty reduction. For the past several years, his major efforts have been devoted to analyze the impact of government expenditures on growth and poverty reduction in India, China, Vietnam, and Thailand. He has also been heavily involved in the IFPRI's China program. Prior to IFPRI, he worked for the International Service for National Agricultural Research, and the University of Arkansas. He received his Ph.D. in applied economics from the University of Minnesota.

Jean Kinsey

Jean Kinsey is Professor in the Department of Applied Economics, University of Minnesota, and Co-Director of The Food Industry Center. She obtained her Ph.D. in Agricultural Economics. She has conducted research in and published in leading journals about: consumer credit behavior, changing food consumption patterns, the economics of information and consumers' welfare loss, and the marginal propensity to consume food away from home when wives work part-time and full-time, where people purchase their food, retail food store performance and the retail food industry. She was Chair of the Board of Directors of the Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis 1996–1997. She was President of the American Agricultural Economics Association in 2002, and has been President of the American Council on Consumer Interests. She was named distinguished fellow of the American Agricultural Economics Association.

Betsey Kuhn

Betsey Kuhn is the Director of the Food and Rural Economy Division (FRED), Economic Research Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture. The Division is responsible for economic policy analysis of a wide range of issues, including diet and health, food safety, food markets, rural development, and food assistance. She received her M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in agricultural and applied economics from Stanford University. She is the author of many articles on futures markets, food safety, conservation easements, food assistance and farm policy and a book, *Global Environmental Change and Agriculture*.

Johan F. M. Swinnen

Johan F. M. Swinnen is Professor of Development Economics and Food Policy, Katholieke Universiteit Leuven, Belgium and Director of the Research Group on Food Policy, Transition & Development. He is Senior Research Fellow, Centre for European Policy Studies (CEPS), Brussels; consultant to many East European governments and international institutions (World Bank, EBRD, OECD, FAO, European Commission). From 1998–2000, he was Economic Advisor, European Commission, Directorate-General for Economic and Financial Affairs (advising on EU agricultural policy, trade issues, East European reforms and EU enlargement, Balkan reconstruction). He has research expertise and publications on political economy, agricultural and food policy, economic and institutional transition, EU enlargement, economics of the media. He received his Ph.D. in agricultural economics from Cornell University in 1992.

Vittorio Santaniello

Vittorio Santaniello is Professor of Economic Policy at the University of Rome Tor Vergata and Coordinator of the International Consortium on Agricultural Biotechnology Research (ICABR). He teaches agricultural policy, economics of natural resources as well as biotechnology. His research interest includes economics of agricultural biotechnology and intellectual property rights. He has published widely on the topics in journals and books. His recent book entitled *Economic and Social Issues in Agricultural Biotechnology* with R. E. Evenson and David Zilberman in 2002. He was born in Naples, Italy.

Daniel W. Bromley

Daniel W. Bromley is Anderson-Bascom Professor of applied economics at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He has been editor of the journal Land Economics since 1974. He has been a consultant to the Global Environment Facility; the World Bank; the Ford Foundation; the U.S. Agency for International Development; the Asian Development Bank; the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development; and the Ministry for the Environment in New Zealand. Professor Bromley has written and edited eleven books, among which are: (1) Economic Interests and Institutions: The Conceptual Foundations of Public Policy; (2) Environment and Economy: Property Rights and Public Policy; (3) Making the Commons Work: Theory, Practice, and Policy; (4) The Handbook of Environmental Economics; and (5) Sustaining Development: Environmental Resources in Developing Countries.

Ramon Lopez

Ramon Lopez is Professor in the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics, University of Maryland at College Park and is Senior Fellow with the Center for Development Research (ZEF) at the University of Bonn. Professor Lopez is Associate Editor of Environment and Development Economics and has been Associate Editor of the Journal of Environmental Economics and Management. He obtained his Ph.D. in Economics from the University of British Columbia. He has been an advisor with various governments and a consultant with several international organizations, including the World Bank, Inter-American Development Bank, FAO and others. His research is focused on agriculture and the environment, international trade, and economic development. He is

the author of a large number of journal articles and of three books: (a) *The Quality of Growth* (with coauthors); (b) *Rural poverty in Latin America* (with A. Valdes); and (c) *Sustainable Development in Latin America: Financing and Policies Working in Synergy* (with J. Jordan).

Simeon Ehui

A national of Côte d'Ivoire, Simeon Ehui has over fifteen years of professional international agricultural experience in Africa, and most recently in Asia. He is presently Coordinator of the Livestock Policy Analysis Program at the International Livestock Research Institute (ILRI). Ehui has authored or co-authored over 70-policy research papers relevant to national researchers and policy makers in Africa and Asia. His writings have covered various topics including: policies for the sustainable management of land and enhancing food security; policies for improving the competitiveness of smallholder livestock producers; and policies for improving domestic and international market access by smallholder livestock producers in the Africa and Asia. Ehui obtained his PhD degree from Purdue University in 1987.

Dr. John Pender

John Pender is a Senior Research Fellow at IFPRI. He leads IFPRI's research program on strategies for sustainable development of less-favored lands. His research focuses on pathways of development and land management in the East African highlands and the Central American hillsides. Prior to joining IFPRI in 1995, Pender was an assistant professor of economics at Brigham Young University. He received his Ph.D. in agricultural and development economics from Stanford University.

Agnes Rola

Agnes Rola (Ph. D. Agricultural Economics, University of Wisconsin-Madison) is Professor at the Institute of Strategic Planning and Policy Studies and an affiliate Professor at the Department of Agricultural Economics, University of the Philippines Los Banos. Her main research interests are in the areas of sustainable agriculture and natural resource management where she has extensive experience both at the field and policy levels. She has recently been involved in a decade long project on policy analysis for environmental management planning in the Philippines. She teaches courses in Policy Analysis and Production Economics. Currently, she sits on several local and international advisory boards for agricultural research.
