
In accordance with section 2279 of the California Food and Agricultural Code, the 1985 crop report for Madera County is hereby submitted.

The total value is \$325,132,000 a decrease of six million dollars or approximately two percent. This was an extremely hard year for growers with most major categories showing declines. Field crops lost \$6.2 million with cotton and wheat the major deficit items. Livestock and Poultry decreased \$1.4 million and Livestock and Poultry Products showed a \$6.3 million loss. Nursery products and apiary both posted a slight gain and Fruit and Nut crops went against the trend with a \$9.1 million increase. It should be noted that much of the Fruit and Nut difference was due to increased acreage harvested rather than real gains. Seed crops, Vegetable crops and Timber Products also dropped in value.

These are gross value figures and do not indicate net income to producers. No reflection is possible on any individual operation since the county is the smallest unit measured for a particular commodity.

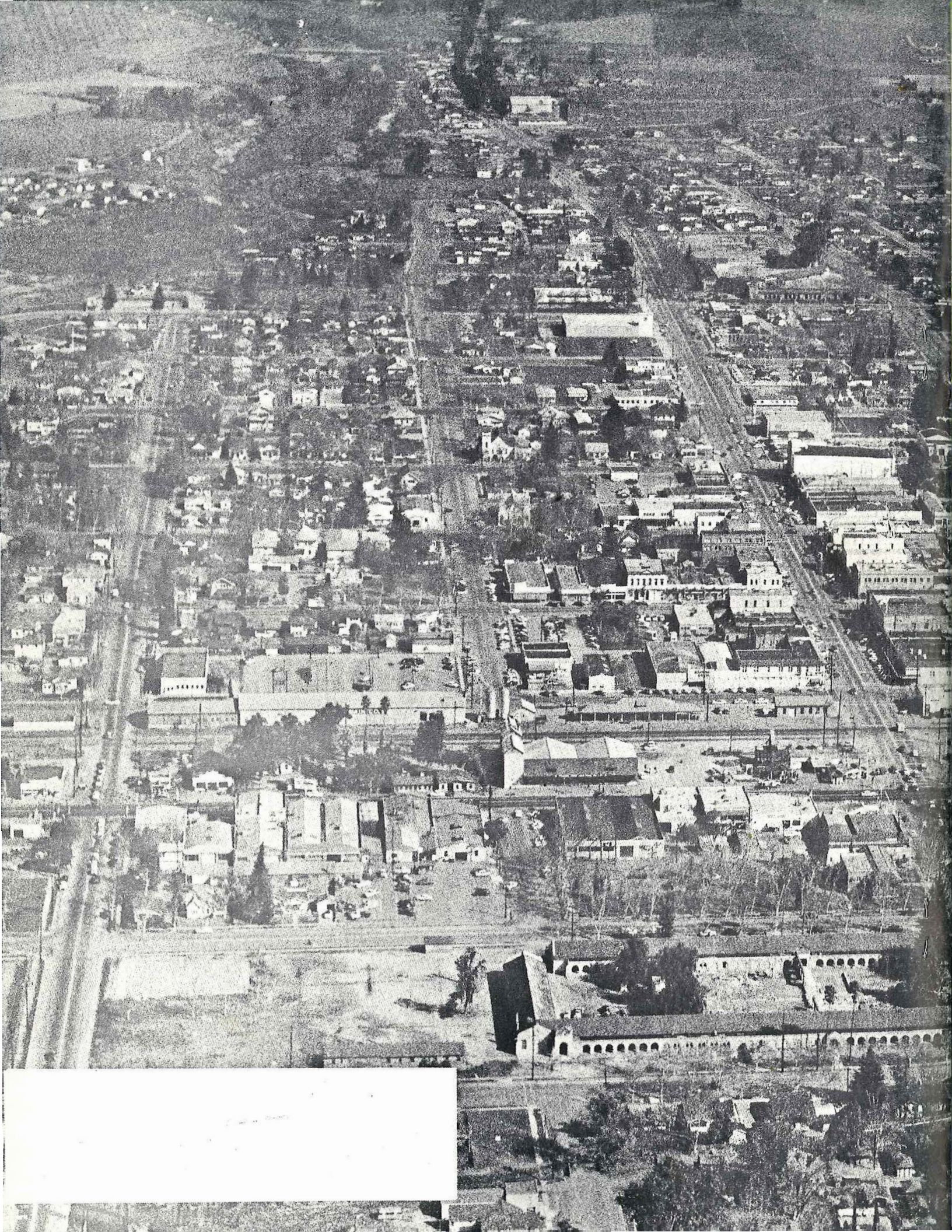

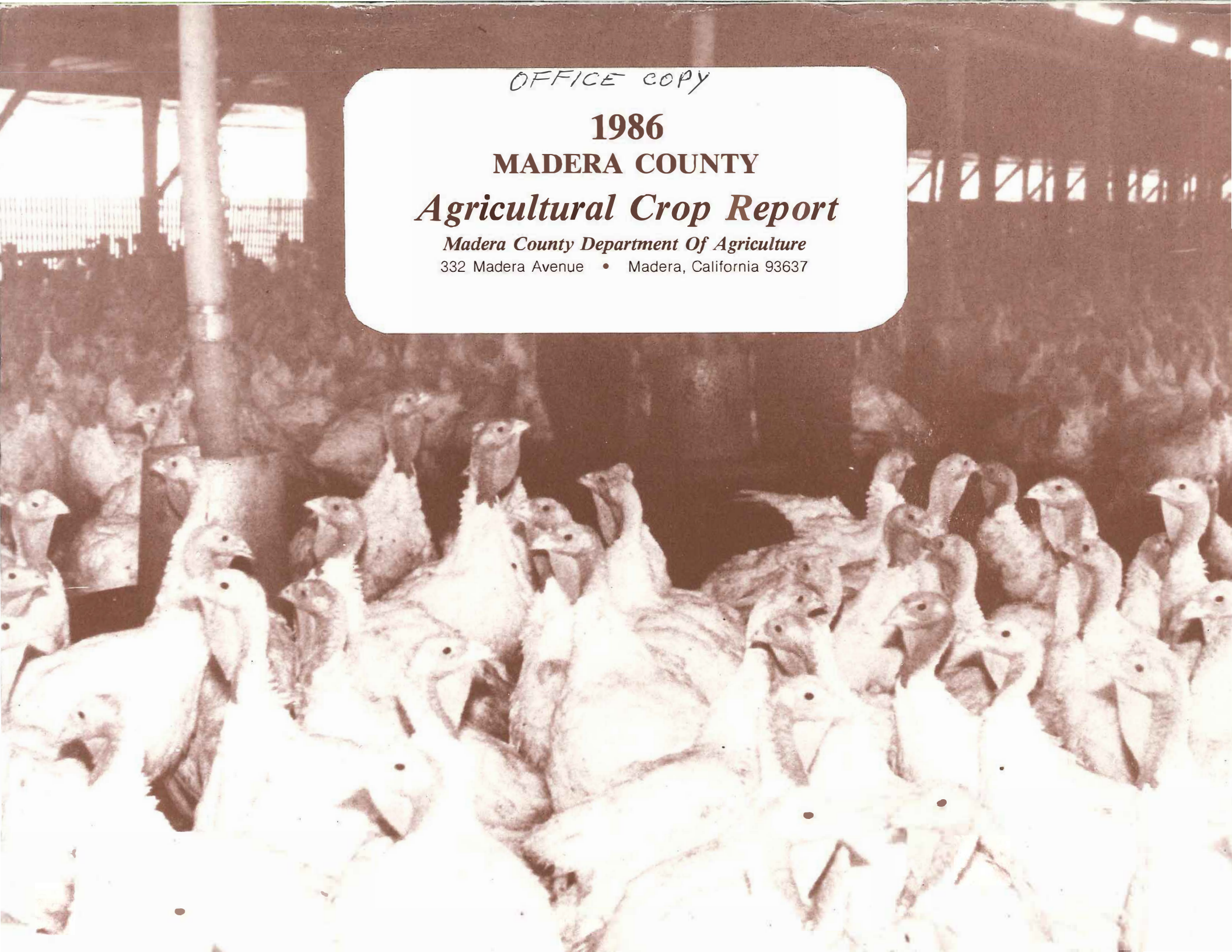

In accordance with section 2279 of the California Food and Agricultural Code, I am pleased to submit the 1986 crop report for Madera County.

The total value is \$372,276,000, an increase of approximately thirty eight and one half million dollars or eleven and one half percent. The primary increase category is fruit and nut crops which gained approximately \$40 million. It must be noted that significant increases in several leading crops do not represent real gains but rather offset major losses in previous years. Examples are: Almonds, which are up \$5.5 million equalling the total value in 1980, but below the high of \$35.6 million in 1979; raisin grapes which gained \$9.3 million, partially offsetting losses in the last few years but still below the peak of \$76.4 million in 1980; and wine grapes which increased \$10.8 million, equalling 1982 but below the record \$48.6 million in 1981. Pistachios, which are alternate bearing, advanced \$5.8 million. Table grapes also posted a significant gain. Oranges went against this trend showing a \$4.2 million loss. Other categories showing increases are: Livestock and Poultry, with Turkeys and Dairy Cattle countering losses in most other commodities; Livestock and Poultry Products; Timber Products; and Vegetable Crops. The major loss category is field crops; down \$13 million with cotton, alfalfa hay, and wheat all declining significantly.

It should be noted that these are gross values and do not indicate net income to producers. These figures do not reflect on any individual operation since the county is the smallest unit measured for a particular commodity.

I sincerely appreciate the efforts of my staff, the staff of the U.C. Cooperative Extension Service and the many individuals who contributed to the preparation of this report. Featured on the cover is a Madera County flock of Nicholas Cross Toms. These birds are pictured at 20 weeks old weighing well above average at 34.56 pounds per bird.

Turkeys have been a part of Madera County agriculture since the early 1930's and have been in the top ten among leading crops for over 20 years. In 1986, turkeys represent 60.6% of the Livestock and Poultry category and 8.8% of the overall value. They rank third among the million dollar crops.

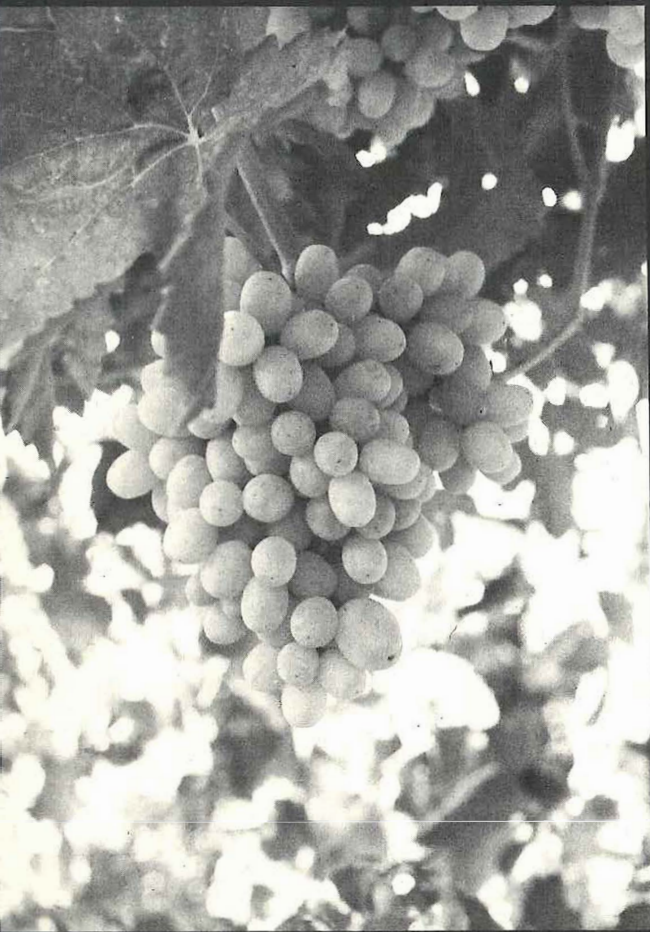

In accordance with section 2279 of the California Food and Agricultural Code, I hereby submit the 1987 crop report for Madera County.

The total value is \$430,633,000, an increase of approximately fifty seven million dollars or fifteen percent. Fruit and nut crops increased \$38.7 million with Almonds, Raisin Grapes, Wine Grapes and Oranges the leading gainers. Pistachios lost \$5.8 million with Nectarines, Olives, Plums and Freestone Peaches also declining. Field Crops were up \$13.3 million with Cotton, Alfalfa and Sugar Beets all posting gains. Nursery Products and Seed Crops experienced significant percentage increases of 72% and 364% respectively. Live-stock & Poultry, Livestock & Poultry Products, Timber Products and Apiary all advanced slightly while vegetable crops went against the trend showing a slight decrease.

It must be noted that these are gross figures and do not indicate net income to producers. Figures shown do not reflect on any individual operation since the whole county is the smallest unit measured for any particular commodity.

I sincerely appreciate the efforts of my staff, the staff of the U.C. Cooperative Extension Service and the many individuals who contributed to the preparation of this report. Special thanks go to Sis Lincoln who compiled the report and to Lore Whatley who was responsible for typing and assembling the publication.

In accordance with section 2279 of the California Food and Agricultural Code, I hereby submit the 1988 crop report for Madera County.

The total value is \$446,010,000; an increase of approximately fifteen and one half million dollars, or three and one half percent.

The Fruit and Nut Crop category was the leading gainer; followed by Field Crops, Livestock & Poultry Products, Nursery Products, Livestock and Poultry and Apiary in that order. Timber Products declined the most with Vegetable Crops and Seed Crops also decreasing.

I would like to devote a little space to the subject of food safety. It is well known that California has the strictest and most comprehensive pesticide regulations in the world. The verification that these regulations are working properly is the residue testing program. This program has been carried out for many years. The results have been very consistent:

There are no residues detected in about 80% of the samples.

Residues below established tolerances are found in about 18% of the samples. Most of these are less than half the tolerance allowed.

Less than 2% are over tolerance. Even these rarely present any health risk because of margins of safety included.

Carl Winter, toxicologist for the Cooperative Extension, University of California, Riverside, reports that naturally occurring chemicals far exceed the traces of man-made pollutants in food. Even so, these "natural pesticides" are not considered concentrated enough to be dangerous.

The evidence is clear. Food grown under California's tight regulatory program is safe and healthful.

I sincerely appreciate the efforts of my staff, the staff of the U.C. Cooperative Extension Service and the many individuals who contributed to the preparation of this report. Special thanks go to Sis Lincoln who compiled the report and to Lore Whatley who was responsible for typing and assembling the publication.

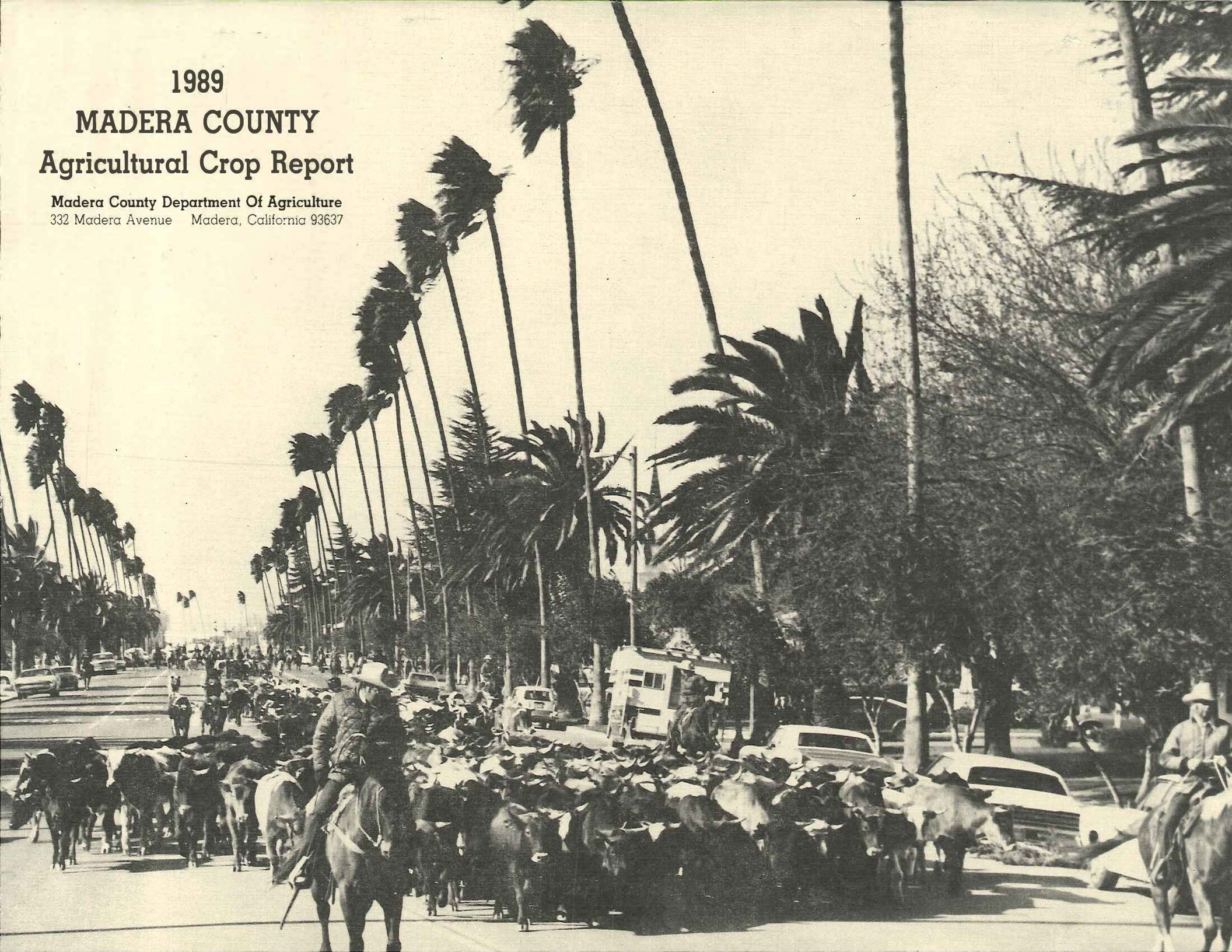

In accordance with section 2279 of the California Food and Agricultural Code, I am pleased to submit the 1989 crop report for Madera County.


The total value is \$478,466,000, an increase of approximately twenty nine million dollars or six percent. Thirty Four crops made the million dollar list. The top ten are: Raisin Grapes; Wine Grapes; Almonds; Market Milk; Cotton Lint; Turkeys; Alfalfa Hay; Cattle & Calves; Table Grapes; and Pistachios.

Fruit and Nut crops showed the largest increase. Leading gainers were Raisins, Almonds and Table Grapes. Pistachios dropped significantly due to lower production. Higher price of Market Milk caused Livestock & Poultry Products to rise. Field crops were up, led by Alfalfa hay. Other categories posting increases were: Timber Products; Livestock & Poultry; Vegetable Crops; and Apiary. Declining categories were Nursery Products and Seed Crops.

It must be noted that these are gross figures and do not indicate net income to producers. Figures shown do not reflect on any individual operation since the whole county is the smallest unit measured for any particular commodity.

I sincerely appreciate the efforts of my staff, the staff of the U.C. Cooperative Extension Service and the many individuals who contributed to the preparation of this report. Special thanks go to Sis Lincoln who compiled the report and to Lore Whatley who was responsible for set up and typing.
