

### YOLO COUNTY AGRICULTURAL FACTS AND FIGURES FROM 1935 FEDERAL FARM CENSUS AND COMPARISONS WITH 1930 CENSUS

A marked advance of the agricultural industry in Yolo County during the five years previous is revealed by figures of the 1935 Federal Farm Census as compared to figures of the 1930 Census.

There were 1844 farms listed as compared to 1641 five years ago indicating increased development of land. The number of full owners increased from 918 to 978, while part owners decreased from 272 to 248. The number of tenants increased from 365 to 348.

The number of acres in farms increased from 488, 252 in 1930 to 556,204 in 1935 while the acreage of the average farm advanced from 297.5 to 301.6 acres.

Acreage harvested showed a substantial gain of from 218,147 acres in 1930 to 243,417 acres in 1935.

With 30,000 acres in crop, Yolo County in 1935 ranked first among counties of the United States in acreage of sugar beets, total production, average yield per acre, record field per acre and sugar content of beets. Sugar beet acreage has rapidly climbed year by year from the 3315 acres of 1930 when production was

55,300 tons. In 1934 the acreage was 23,850 and the production was 430,382 tons.



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



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## Crop Report for 1939

## YOLO COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

This annual crop report has been compiled for those seeking crop statistics of Yolo County. This report has been made possible through the cooperation of growers, shippers, packers, the County Soil Conservation committee and other interested parties.

The figures given are as accurate as the extent of our ability to contact all sources of information. The values and prices are based on average as nearly as possible.

The 1938-1939 precipitation was less than one half the normal rainfall taken over a forty year period. This, with the inadequate supply of irrigation water from Clear Lake, has materially reduced the yields on non-irrigated and on most irrigated crops. One exception to an irrigated crop was a three ton per acre increase of sugar beets over the previous season's average. Another exception was the cannery tomato crop. A long warm fall helped materially to increase the yield per acre.

The last session of the State Legislature added Section 65.5 to the Agricultural Code, "The Commissioner shall compile reports of the condition, acreage, production and value of the agricultural products in his county. The commissioner may publish such reports and transmitt a copy thereof to the State Director of Agriculture."

May we here express our appreciation to those who assisted the County Department of Agriculture in compiling these figures.



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

Gentlemen:

This is the third annual crop report of Yolo County as authorized by Section 66.5 of the Agricultural Code which requires Agricultural Commissioners to compile reports on acreage, production and value of the agricultural products in their counties.

During the past year there has been an active demand for crop statistics by government agencies, banks, growers' organizations, buyers, real estate firms, Chambers of Commerce and others.

This report brings together Yolo County's agricultural statistics which include horticulture, livestock, crop acreage, value and production of field crops and prices paid to farmers. The value of these figures is based on the accuracy of the information and the willingness of the cooperators to give this information. The total value is based on f. o. b. prices which do not reflect the actual amount of money received by the producers. The production and income figures were based on information obtained from growers, packers, warehouse receipts, farmers, agricultural agencies and others.

In summing up the 1940 growing season it proved to be an ideal year with precipitation somewhat over the normal, producing excellent pasture, resulting in a good lamb crop and all field crops were materially aided by the mild weather conditions prevailing throughout the year. The tonnage of tree crops such as almonds, prunes and apricots, was appreciably under that of the preceding year, but the one exception being olives which had the greatest tonnage this county has ever recorded.

It is the desire of the County Department of Agriculture to express its appreciation to all those who have contributed so generously and willingly in order to make possible the compilation of these figures.







rather than the net received by the producer, but they  
show the financial income to Yolo County since material  
and labor costs have not been deducted. It will be  
noted that a 24% net return has resulted over the  
preceding crop year.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation



AGRICULTURAL CROP REPORT

This crop report for Yolo County is the first compilation of crop statistics since 1941. The Agricultural Code requires that a report be made annually, but this was dispensed with during the war years.

The net income of farm crops are not as accurate as they might be due to the difficulty in segregating labor, material and many other costs. In a report such as this there is obviously a partial duplication of value, as for example alfalfa hay which is feed out to dairy cattle and valued as alfalfa hay and revalued as butter fat. In the shipments of fresh fruits and vegetables the cost of packing and containers is included in the reported receipts, but whenever possible the net return to the grower has been given.

As elsewhere in the state, labor costs have been high and efficiency down, while maintenance and machinery cost has been high and new equipment almost impossible to purchase. Therefore, these commodity incomes do not show the exact returns received by the producer.

Even though the annual rainfall was subnormal, other climatic conditions favored a large yield of all crops through out the county.

All available sources of information have been contacted to make this report as accurate and complete as possible and credit is due the following for their assistance; Yolo County Agricultural Conservation Association, shippers, buyers and growers.





AGRICULTURE PRODUCTION REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1947\*

Farm production in 1947 averaged a normal yield for all crops in the county. Sugar beet production was most outstanding with an average yield of 20.14 tons per acre of 16.58 per cent sugar. This milled a total of 1,260,367 one hundred pound sacks of sugar. The average return for the deciduous fruit crops were relatively low with the exception of almond and cannery pears. Price offered for grapes and figs were below the cost of production in most cases. An active demand for cannery tomatoes came, after unfavorable growing conditions materially reduced the eastern crop. Grain prices rapidly advanced during the post-harvest season and was a definite factor in forcing livestock and poultry to an early market.

Farm wages during the year remained at an all time high as did the operating cost of handling, processing, and transportation. This materially reduced the net income received by the grower.\*\*

This report has been made possible by information given to the staff of the County Department of Agriculture by the County Agriculture Conservation Association, growers, stockmen, packers, processors, and shippers. Their cooperation has been greatly appreciated.





The planting and growing of many agricultural crops in 1948 was affected by the uncertain water supply resulting from the drought that prevailed in California during January, February and March. Outlook for a productive year brightened when late spring rains in mid-April made further ration of electrical power unnecessary. All crops, however, were retarded from two to three weeks, and in some instances, the quality was affected by the abnormal weather conditions. The sugar content of most fruit, such as apricots, peaches, prunes and grapes, was appreciably below normal. Despite the adverse growing season, however, production was average.

Leading in financial returns as well as in acreage planted were barley and wheat, with a gross farm value of \$7,976,500. Livestock followed with a gross return to producers of \$5,240,992. The income from apricots and figs fell substantially below the cost of production. The peach market, due to a small crop, was better than firm. Canning peaches were in great demand.

The cool weather that continued throughout the summer plus a late season reduced the sugar content of sugar beets. Early rains and frost materially lowered the yield of cannery tomatoes, while alfalfa hay and rice grown under the adverse conditions showed a favorable return. Despite shrinking farm prices, cost of materials, transportation and labor remained at a high level.







This Agricultural Crop Report is to make known the condition, acreage, production and value of all crops grown in Yolo County and is authorized under Section 65.5 of the California Agricultural Code. We wish to point out that the financial returns represent the average gross farm value which the grower received, and includes production, harvesting and in some cases cost of packing and transportation.

The five leading field crops with the greatest financial return to growers were as follows: sugar beets, barley, tomatoes, alfalfa hay and rice. Income from livestock ranked second to field crops in monetary returns to growers; while the leading tree crops in the order of their importance were almonds, prunes and apricots, with figs showing the poorest returns.

The subnormal rainfall with an exceptionally cold winter and spring were not conducive to growing conditions, but late rains and ideal weather contributed to a normal yield of all crops. A continued drop in the underground water table contributed an additional expense to growers where pumped water was used to produce an irrigated crop.

In this county the agricultural trend is toward planting of additional acreages of alfalfa and irrigated pasture. This undoubtedly will result in an additional increase in animal production.

I wish to acknowledge my sincere appreciation to all those who have so generously assisted my inspectors with information that has made this report possible.



The California Agricultural Code requires the Agricultural Commissioner to compile each year a report of the condition, acreage, production and value of all crops grown in his county. We wish to emphasize to the reader that the financial return to growers represent the gross farm value, and in no way do these figures represent the net income received.

A resume of the weather conditions, which were important in maturing crops, can be stated as follows: During the first quarter of the 1950 crop year, prevailing cold temperatures noticeably retarded pasture and crop growth. A light rainfall was recorded, while low temperatures set a good bud crop on all deciduous fruits, with prunes being the exception. During the second quarter, relatively high temperatures were favorable to the development of all crops. Irrigation practices were started during this quarter to offset the lack of sufficient rainfall and to promote crop growth. Weather during the third quarter started with high temperatures causing sunburn damage to prunes, walnuts and the first picking of tomatoes, but favored the production of alfalfa, rice, sugar beets, beans and melons. The last quarter of the year general rains prevailed and impeded the harvesting of late crops.

The crops showing the largest financial returns are listed in the following order: sugar beets, barley, tomatoes, rice and alfalfa hay. Production of alfalfa hay has been increasing the last few years, and the market for this crop started strong. However, early fall rains reduced the demands until the price was slightly above the cost of production.

The assistance and cooperation received from growers, processors, shippers and others has made the compiling of this report possible, and to them I wish to express my sincere appreciation.



In compliance with Section 65.5 of the California Agricultural Code, I herewith submit the 1951 annual crop report as to the condition, acreage, production and value of all crops grown in Yolo County.

This report presents the gross farm value and should not be confused in evaluating the net income received by the producer.

The 1951 marketing orders regulating the sale of prunes, almonds and walnuts, while stabilizing the domestic market, reduced the calculated returns to the producers.

Climatic conditions, which are one of the determining factors in the growing and maturing of a successful crop, can briefly be summarized as follows: There was more than ample rain during January and February, which retarded field operations. Drying north winds in March warranted early irrigation of some field crops. These unfavorable conditions resulted in a reduced planting of grain and favored the additional acreage planted to rice, tomatoes, grain sorghums and beans.

Twenty-five thousand (25,000) acres planted to tomatoes which grossed \$12,750,000.00 surpassed any other crop in monetary returns.

Returns from the sale of livestock gained over the previous year approximately 80% which can be attributed to additional planting of forage crops and irrigated pasture, together with a strong market.

Seasonal farm labor in most cases proved adequate, but transportation facilities were not sufficient to meet the demand at the peak of the harvest season and were overtaxed when most needed.

To all those who have so generously helped in compiling this annual crop report, I wish to extend my sincere appreciation.
